I could find that big picture without ever looking for it. I still work that way, one day at a time and each day I start fresh. I'm free.


When I walked through the gallery watching your show take shape it gave me a good, easy feeling. Seeing all those pictures from different places and times moving around, gathering together.

David Bowes (born in 1957) is a painter originally from Boston, United States. After living in Newton, he moved to New York, where he became closely connected with the art scene of the 1980s. He has exhibited in galleries and museums in the United States and Europe, with significant participation in the 48th Venice Biennale curated by Harald Szeemann (1991).

His works are held in the Collection Maramotti in Reggio Emilia, the Museum of Contemporary Art in Lissone, the National Gallery of Iceland in Reykjavik, the Walker Art Center in Minneapolis, and the Portland Art Museum. Bowes is the winner of the Lissone Prize (2020-2021). After living in various Italian cities, including Rome, Naples, Florence, and Palermo, he is currently based in Turin.
